Legislative News: Two-Week Review

- <u>HB 272</u> (Sen. Oelslager) **Court Jurisdiction**, House concurred in Senate amendments, 9.1.20. The bill expands the basis of a court's exercise of personal jurisdiction to include any basis consistent with the Ohio and U.S. Constitutions; in other words, Ohio's long-arm jurisdiction is expanded. The bill also contained two amendments restricting the Governor's authority to either change elections or close houses of worship during a public health emergency.
- HB 606 (Rep. Grendell) COVID-19 **Civil Immunity**, conference committee reports bill favorably, 9.1.20. The bill grants civil immunity to a person who provides services for essential businesses and operations for injury, death, or loss that was caused by the transmission of COVID-19 during the period of emergency declared by Executive Order 2020-01D. The bill was originally meant to expire 12.31.20, but an amendment in conference committee makes the expiration date 12.31.21.
- <u>HB 753</u> (Rep. Becker) **Negligent Assault**, introduced 8.31.20. The bill adds to RC 2903.14 (Negligent Assault) by prohibiting an adult from negligently causing physical harm to someone younger than 13. The crime is an M4.
- Effective 9.4.20 until 12.31.20, the U.S. Center for Disease Control has issued an <u>order</u> to temporarily **halt residential evictions** to slow the spread of COVID-19. The halt in evictions is not limited to federally-supported housing as in the CARES Act, but is limited to cases of non-payment of rent (eviction complaints can still be filed). To prevail, a tenant <u>must show</u> by a preponderance of the evidence that: (1) the tenant made efforts to get government assistance with rent; (2) the tenant was eligible for a stimulus check; (3) the tenant was unable to pay rent because of loss of job, hours, or wages or because of extraordinary medical costs; (4) the tenant made best efforts to make partial rent payments; and (5) if evicted, the tenant would become homeless or be forced to move in with other people in close quarters. - The Ohio Judicial Conference has recently updated its <u>Budget Resource Handbook</u>. The case law is now updated through 2020, new guidance on the use of special project funds is included, and a new section on budget crises has been added.
- On 8.31.20, the Sentencing Commission's Ad Hoc Committee on a **Uniform Sentencing Entry** produced its <u>report with recommendations</u>, as well as <u>appendices</u>.
- Several Court Rule <u>amendments</u> went into effect 7.1.20; an explanation of the changes to **Civil Rules of Practice and Procedure** 4, 16, 26, and 53 written by Judge Frye of Franklin County, for the OSBA can be found on the OJC website.
- The **Ohio Public Defender** has released a <u>new memo</u> outlining options it has developed for counties in an effort to provide support and assistance during the COVID-19 pandemic.
