Legislative News: Two-Week Review

- The Supreme Court is submitting its annual package of **Rules amendments to the legislature**, 5.1.24. In the proposed Rules is a new change to JuvR 9 which may impact a juvenile judge's use of diversion, particularly for felonies. The Rule is also expected to be altered to accommodate notifications compliant with Mary's Law.
- In <u>State v. Williams</u> (Slip Opinion No. 2024-Ohio-14330, decided 4.18.24, the Court held a juvenile could face a charge in adult court that the juvenile court did not transfer during a **bindover proceeding**. The majority opinion, citing <u>State v. Burns</u> (170 Ohio St.3d 57, 2022-Ohio-4606), stated that a juvenile could face a charge in adult court that was not charged originally in juvenile court if "the charge is rooted in the same acts that were the subject of the juvenile complaint."
- <u>HB 161</u> (Reps. Hillyer, Miranda) Spousal **Exception for Sexual Assault**, passed the Senate 4.24.24. The bill eliminates spousal exceptions for the offenses of rape, sexual battery, unlawful sexual conduct with a minor, gross sexual imposition, sexual imposition, and importuning. It also permits a person to testify against the person's spouse in a prosecution for any of those offenses.
- <u>HB 497</u> (Reps. Klopfenstein, Stewart) **County Government Changes**, introduced 4.22.24. The bill makes a variety of changes to county law and incorporates two items that impact courts: (1) it modernizes statutes that govern the way that certain court proceedings are to take place, per iCourt Task Force recommendations, and (2) it includes language that levying a cost in a case when a juvenile is transferred should not automatically create a final disposition of the case.
- <u>HB 498</u> (Rep. Carruthers) **Eliminating R.C. 2927.13**, introduced 4.22.24. The bill removes the criminal offense related to donating blood when the donor is a carrier of the virus that causes AIDS.
- <u>HB 500</u> (Reps. Carruthers, Upchurch) **Aggravated Trespass and Ethnic Intimidation**, introduced 4.22.24. The bill expands the offenses of Aggravated Trespass and Ethnic Intimidation and creates the new offense of Unlawful Image Projection onto Private Property.
- The Ohio Attorney General announced \$2.45 million in funding available to courts to help improve the completeness of the **state's criminal records database**. Funding has been allocated in 3 parts: \$1.2 million for LiveScan devices (digital fingerprint capturing machines); \$750,000 for juvenile courts or clerks of courts to electronically report adjudication information; and \$500,000 for common pleas, municipal, or county courts and clerks of courts to defray the cost of recovering case dispositions not previously reported to BCI. The deadline to apply for the grants is 5.15.24.
- On 5.2.24, the Ohio State Bar Foundation is holding a symposium on **trauma informed lawyering** at the Ohio Statehouse. Register or contact Lisa Ray with questions.
