Legislative News: Two-Week Review

- <u>HB 5</u> (Reps. Baker, Ray) **Adoption Modernization**, concurred on by the House and sent to the Governor for signature, 12.4.24. Among other things, the bill streamlines the process for foreign adoptions and allows a relative, kinship caregiver, legal custodian, or guardian who is adopting to count the child's time in their home toward the 6-month period required before an adoption is final
- <u>HB 111</u> (Reps. LaRe, Miller) **Domestic Violence Penalties**, passed by the Senate and sent to Governor for signature, 12.4.24. The bill creates a presumption of prison for F3 domestic violence and increases the sentencing ranges (from 6 months to 12 months; and from 12 months to 18 months).
- <u>HB 338</u> (Reps. Sweeney, White) **Child Support for Adult Children with Disabilities**, concurred on by the House and sent to the Governor for signature, 12.4.24. The bill allows child support orders to be issued, modified, or extended for children with a disability, even if the children are older than 18. The bill was amended to include a change to the status of the judge of the Lebanon Municipal Court from part-time to full-time. Another amendment clarified disbursement of funds related to computerization fees.
- Governor's Work Group on Competency Restoration and Diversion completed its work and published a report, 11.21.24. Some of the recommendations include: piloting pre-trial mental health diversion facilities while charges are held in abeyance; streamlining motions for competency evaluations; and expanding assisted outpatient treatment to more counties. Recommendations that were marked as needing additional discussion include: developing "competency teams" in Ohio courts; expanding specialized docket criteria to allow rural communities to combine dockets; and to expand the use of ILC for more mental health treatment diversion.
- The National Center for State Courts has been supporting congressional efforts to pass the federal Countering Threats and Attacks on Our Judges Act, which would create a national resource center for state/local judges on judicial security. The bill was introduced in both the Senate and House, and unanimously passed the Senate in June. Consider sending a letter or email to House Judiciary Committee Chairman Jim Jordan to express support for placing the Senate-passed bill on the House suspension calendar for consideration before the end of the year.
- HB 33, the state operating budget, amended R.C. 117.103 to require the Auditor of State to create training material detailing **Ohio's fraud-reporting system** and the means of reporting fraud, waste, and abuse. The section stipulates the <u>training is mandatory</u> for all public employees and elected officials. Deadlines for completing the training vary; common pleas court judges <u>must complete training by 12.29.24</u>.
